Phil 232 CREDITING SOURCES IN YOUR PAPER

The following is the form you should use for various kinds of sources that you use in writing a paper. That is, if you either use a direct quote from a source, or get a specific idea from a source, you must give credit to that source. And you do that by putting a note at the end of the sentence that you are crediting—either a footnote (at the bottom of the page), or an endnote (all the notes show up at the end of the paper). (I don't care if you use footnotes or endnotes.) If you do not know how to do this, let me know.

Name of site. Description of site. Who "hosts" or "tends" the site (to establish credibility). description of item that you are using from the site. URL of site. For example:

"H-Afro-Am: African-American Studies". Provides social science and humanities sources about African American studies. Hosted by MATRIX, an academic research center at Michigan State University. www.h-net.org/~afro-am/
