

ON-LINE HOLOCAUST RESOURCES

1) The most comprehensive on-line resource about the Holocaust (and genocide more generally) is the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum: www.ushmm.org

This site has articles on hundreds of aspects of the Nazi period and the Holocaust. You can access a particular topic by going to the "Holocaust Encyclopedia," on the left part of the home page. If you go to "Holocaust History," on the same part of the home page, the next page will have "personal histories" as one of the options. That will give you various aspects of the Holocaust, and most of the articles there will have personal testimonies, in video form, attached to them. In fact, most of the articles in the Encyclopedia have at least one personal testimony attached to them, and one such testimony generally leads to others.

2) Spielberg Shoah Foundation: <http://college.usc.edu/vhi/>

This archive was created by Steven Spielberg in the wake of the success of his Schindler's List film. It has many personal testimonies on-line.

3) Fortunoff Archive: www.library.yale.edu/testimonies/excerpts/index.html

This is the oldest and most established archive of Holocaust testimonies, at Yale University in New Haven, CT. A small number of their testimonies can be found on-line at this address.

You might need some software that you do not yet have to access some of this material, but you will be told what it is, and generally given the option to download it for free on the spot.
